


Sorting Country Folders – what does this mean

- Copying at risk papers
- Merging different country folders
 - Papers sorted into date order
 - Cross referencing where country information is located in different part of the archives
- Celebrating and assessing historical documents







Link between disability and poverty

Disability affects nearly every fifth household in developing countries and is a prevalent contributing factor to family poverty.

An already poor household has an added financial burden when a disabled family member is not involved in productive activities. In the context of extreme poverty, a disability may sometimes turn into an asset when the person uses begging as a way to bolster the family income. But this is a degrading path that does not lead out of poverty.

What aggravates the situation is the fact that poverty is identified as one of the main causes of disability. This is especially so for those at the lowest strata of society who live in precarious conditions without education, hygiene and health

An important element of measures aimed at families living in absolute poverty is that they learn how to prevent ability. They must also learn that a disabled family member can take part in economic activities.


CONFERENCE ON SOCIAL WORK


The Duke of Kent has consented to preside at the closing session of the Third International Conference on Social Work, of which he is president, at Bedford College, London, and the Government is to give a reception to the delegates at Lancaster House, London, on Tuesday next. The conference will begin on Monday next. It will be preceded on Sunday by special services at St. Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Cathedral, and it will continue till the following Friday. A thousand delegates, from many countries and from many parts of Great Britain, are to discuss many aspects of social work, particularly in relation to the community. Membership is open to all social workers, professional and voluntary, and to all interested in social service. Full information may be had of the secretary to the British National Committee, Denison House, Vauxhall Bridge Road, S.W.I.

History 1847 -1928

- The era of International Congresses (Conferences) which lead to the setting up of the International Permanent Secretariat of Social Workers (IPSSW) in 1932.
- International Conferences were being held since 1847 with the first more social work focused event in 1889 in Paris – the 1st International Congress (Conference) on Statutory and Voluntary Assistance. This was followed by Conferences in Geneva 1896, Paris 1900, Milan 1906 and Copenhagen 1920.
- The 1st International Conference of Social Work was held in Paris in July 1928. This format brought together over 5000 delegates, representing 42 countries. This provides the framework for the current day IASSW, ICSW and IFSW.


IFSW history through International Conferences 1928

History 1940 – 50s



The 1948 meetings in New York lead to the development of plans for setting up the current IFSW. This was achieved in 1956 at the 8th International Social Work Conference when IFSW was constituted and legally incorporated 1957.
