## The 15<sup>th</sup> Eurasia Forum of Social Workers 2024 marks a historic milestone for the social work profession

The conference, titled "Buen Vivir: Shared Future for Transformative Change from the Perspective of Social Work in Eurasia,"



The 15th Eurasia Forum of Social Workers 2024 marks a historic milestone for the social work profession, as it is the first occasion in which social workers from 21 countries have gathered to exchange knowledge, present academic works, and showcase innovations in the field of social work. This event emphasizes the significance of collaborative learning in the dimensions of intercultural work, particularly in relation to global climate change and its impact on people's quality of life. Mr. Varawut Silpa-archa, Minister of Social Development and Human Security, presided over the opening ceremony, while Mr. Anukul Peedkaew, Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Social Development and Human Security, conducted the closing ceremony.



The conference, titled "Buen Vivir: Shared Future for Transformative Change from the Perspective of Social Work in Eurasia," was held from March 20 to 22, 2024, at the Leaning and Training Center for Older Persons in Bang Lamung District, Chonburi Province, Thailand. It was organized by five collaborative organizations: the Social Work Professions Council, the Ministry of Social Development and Human Security, the Eurasia Forum of Social Workers, the Philippine Association of Social Workers Incorporated (PASWI), and Pattaya City. The conference aimed to provide a platform for the exchange of knowledge, sharing of professional skills, and presentation of new innovations in the field of social work.

Participants included social work professionals from executive, academic, practitioner, and working group levels, totaling 230 individuals from 20 countries and one special economic zone. This diverse representation included attendees from Russia, the Philippines, India, the United Kingdom, Italy, Mongolia, Belarus, Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, South Korea, Iran, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Armenia, Hong Kong Special Administrative Region, Singapore, Vietnam, Myanmar, Malaysia, China, and Thailand.

Prof. Rapeepan Khamhom, President of the Social Work Professions Council, stated that this event marks the first occasion in which the number of participants has achieved a record high. Typically, attendance ranges from 5 to 10 countries, totaling approximately 50 to 100 individuals. Notably, more than 10 participants from the Arctic traveled for over 35 hours and incurred expenses exceeding 50,000 baht on airfare to attend this meeting. Importantly, this forum facilitated a significant phenomenon of collaboration among high-level leaders with decision-making authority from 8 countries, who collectively signed 8 memorandums of cooperation in the field of social work. The Social Work Professions Council established agreements with four countries: (1) India, (2) CSWPD Bangladesh, (3) AASW Armenia, and (4) IrASW Iran. Furthermore, the 16th Eurasia Forum of Social Workers is scheduled to take place in Korea in 2025 and in Mongolia in 2026.

## Report on the 2024 Joint World Conference on Social Work, Education, and Social Development





The 2024 Joint World Conference on Social Work, Education, and Social Development was held in Panama from 4 to 7 April 2024, co-hosted by the International Federation of Social Workers (IFSW), the International Council on Social Welfare (ICSW), and the International Association of Schools of Social Work (IASSW). The theme for this year's conference was "Respecting Diversity in Social Work."

The event brought together approximately 1,500 social workers from 81 countries across five continents. Preceding the conference, the IFSW General Meeting took place over two days, beginning on 2 April, where representatives from more than 30 national social work organisations gathered both in person and online to deliberate on IFSW governance matters.



A particularly significant agenda item for the Asia-Pacific region was the membership applications of Taiwan and Cambodia to IFSW. Following thorough discussions, both countries' memberships were approved by a majority vote.

# The theme for this year's conference was "Respecting Diversity in Social Work."

During the opening address of the conference. Ms. Kenya Batista. President of the Panama Association of Social Workers, warmly welcomed attendees and emphasised the importance of solidarity and collaboration among social workers worldwide to tackle diverse social issues. She underscored the necessity of sharing experiences, learning from one another, and developing innovative solutions that respect the unique diversity of each community. Highlighting the persistent challenges of economic inequality, drug-related violence, migration issues, and human trafficking in Latin America, she called for continued efforts to address these problems and break free from the lingering effects of colonialism.

The conference also celebrated a significant honour for Professor Itsuki Akimoto of Shukutoku University, who was awarded the Katherine A. Kendall Memorial Award. Presented biennially by IASSW, this prestigious award recognises individuals with outstanding achievements in research and education in international social work. Professor Akimoto's groundbreaking work on Buddhist social work theory, which emphasises the importance of respecting regional and ethnic identities, as well as his contributions as a former Vice President of IASSW and President of the Asia-Pacific Region, earned him this accolade.

Looking ahead, the next Joint World Conference is scheduled to take place in

Kenya, marking a return to Africa. Mr. Joachim Mumba, IFSW President and a representative from Zambia, highlighted the critical need for community-based social work practices to build inclusive societies where no one is left behind. Quoting an African proverb, "Wisdom is like a baobab tree; no one individual can embrace it," Mr. Mumba stressed the importance of collaboration among social workers globally and pledged his efforts to ensure the success of the 2026 conference in Kenya.

Lastly, in 2025, the Asia-Pacific region will host the Asia-Pacific Social Work Conference in Sri Lanka. We warmly invite everyone to join this significant regional event.

# Association of Professional Social Workers of Cambodia (APSWC) and the Sustainable Development Goals 2030







#### Introduction

In Cambodia, social workers are often misunderstood with other more commonly known professions and referred to as charitable-related activities or humanitarian work; they are addressed as "teachers" or "NGO staff". This is still little public awareness about the uniqueness of this profession.

The first professional social work education program, a 4-year Bachelor degree was introduced in 2008 by the Royal

University of Phnom Penh (RUPP), in partnership with the University of Washington. In 2009 a Master's degree program started, under the managerial and technical support of EWHA Woman's University of Korea. Two more bachelors' degree programs of social work were also then created, a program belongs to the National Institute of Social Affairs in 2011, and another program by the Saint Paul Institute began in 2013.

About the Association of Professional Social Workers of Cambodia (APSWC) and the Sustainable Development Goals 2030

APSWC was founded in January 2014 by a group of professional social workers as an independent and autonomous body with non-political or religious affiliation.

It is the only existing independent body with the primary goal to upholding the code of conduct, values, and practice in social work.

APSWC proudly represents social workers at national and international platforms, aiming at attaining the SDGs 2030, goal 16 "to promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels".



#### **Events**

(i) BUEN VIVIR 'shared future for transformative change': In March 2024, the APSWC, in partnership with the Ministry of Social Affairs, Veterans and Youth Rehabilitation (MoSVY) and key NGOs organized the Social Work Day with 300 participants. The digitalization world has changed many aspects, impacting on social, economic and environment – the work of social workers is a pivotal in meeting the emerging needs of clients, especially women, children, people with disabilities and vulnerable groups, for updating themselves with new knowledge and skills continuously.

(ii) Approximately, 180 social workers participated in the first time ever, a series of training workshops organized by APSWC throughout the year. This provides a foundation skill to social workers applying in their daily work with clients and as a review for their skills. The course topics include (i) introduction to social work values, ethics and core principles; (ii) social work theories and helping process; (iii) basic counseling skills; (iv) case management in child protection; and (v) self-care for social worker.

### **Upcoming Events**

In partnership with Association for International Social Work (AISW) a two-day Child Protection Workshop will organize in March 2025 in Cambodia. The Ministry of Social Affairs, Veterans and Youth Rehabilitation, development partner, key non-governmental organizations, educational institutes and international lecturers will be the guest speakers to share knowledge, practices, researches, and lessons learned for the improvement of social work profession and excellent service delivery in addressing challenges faced by children and promoting their well-being toward obtaining the sustainable development goals by 2030. Around 50 social workers are expected to gather at this event where the Toyota Foundation will fund this initiative.
