

Akudo Amadiogwu is a Senior Lecturer in Social Work at Canterbury Christ Church University and a Fellow of the Higher Education Academy. She is a registered social worker having graduated with a MA Social Work (Distinction) from the University of Kent and a Masters in Early Years (New Leaders in Early Years) from Canterbury Christ Church University, Kent. Her doctoral interest explores brain injury and migration. Akudo has certificates from the University of Cambridge in Learning and Memory in the Brain and Executive Coaching.
