

Daniel Flores is a social worker of Kolla origin from Jujuy, Argentina. He holds a Bachelor's degree in Social Work (Universidad Nacional de Lomas de Zamora) and is a Specialist in Social and Community Medicine (Universidad Nacional de Córdoba). He also holds diplomas in Intercultural Health (Universidad Nacional de Jujuy) and in Cultural Management (Ministerio de Cultura de la Nación).

He works in public health (Centro de Salud N° 3) and adult education (CENS N° 15) in Ushuaia, Tierra del Fuego, Argentina. Daniel serves as Coordinator of the FAAPS Commission on Working Conditions and is a union delegate for SUTEF. He is an Indigenous communicator in the programme *Hijos de la Tierra* and coordinates the Indigenous Peoples' organisation Ushuaia–Manta, which promotes conferences, photographic exhibitions, ceremonies, dialogues, and film cycles.

He is a member of the Indigenous Peoples' Chair at Universidad Nacional de Tierra del Fuego and the UNESCO Chair on Racism and Discrimination in Higher Education at Universidad Nacional de Tres de Febrero. He co-authored the proposal for which Evo Morales was awarded an Honorary Doctorate (UNTDF). Daniel also coordinates the itinerant cinema initiative *Recorriendo las Huellas de Nuestros Abuelos*, with more than 40 film screenings throughout Argentina, showcasing the history and contemporary realities of Indigenous Peoples through documentary film. In addition, he has coordinated five national social work conferences in Ushuaia, given lectures at universities on Indigenous issues, migration, and urban settlements, and conducted research work on the participation of Indigenous soldiers in the 1982 Malvinas War.
